## Course No. I: Research Methodology

**Objectives:** This course will provide theoretical and methodological tools of writing history and will help them in understanding research format and processes doing historical research.

#### **Course contents:**

- **Historical Theory:** Idealism, Positivism, Marxism, Neo Marxism, Post modernism and writing of history (this topic will be taught by providing case studies of Indian historians and their texts).
- Expanding horizons of writing histories: Local history, Regional history, Intellectual history, Social history, Economic history, Oral history, Environmental history and Cultural history.
- Historical Method: Framing of research problem, note making and bibliography, archives in Maharashtra, archaeological, anthropological methods of data collection, surveys and interviews, internal and external criticism, Historical reasoning, Interpretation of data, Presentation of data and Footnotes.

## **Course No. II: Foundation Course**

**Objectives:** This course will provide conceptual frame of major thematics of India history and will give them critical understanding of various approaches of Indian history writing

#### **Course content:**

- Ancient India: State formation in ancient India, Buddhist age, Varna, caste and gender in ancient India.
- Medieval India: Feudal Charecter, nature and evolution of state, Socio-religious movements
- Modern India: Colonial state and economy, Nationalism, caste –class-gender and social movements.
- Approaches: Orientalist, Imperialist, Nationalist, Marxist, Subaltern, Feminist and Phule-Ambedkarite.

# **Course No. III: History of Early Deccan**
