

Guidelines for Research Paper Submission

- 1. Formatting: Submit papers in MS Word format. Use Times New

 Roman, 12-point font, and 1.5 line spacing for English papers. For Marathi and

 Hindi papers, use Unicode font, size 14. Maintain 1-inch margins on all sides.
- 2. Abstract: Include an abstract of 200-250 words along with 4-5 relevant keywords.
- 3. Word Limit: The full paper should be between 1700 to 2000 words, including references.
- 4. Citation Style: All references must be properly cited using either APA or MLA style.

 In-text citations and a references/bibliography section are mandatory.
- 5. Plagiarism Policy: As submission will be checked for plagiarism. The similarity index should not exceed 10%.
- 6. Authorship: A maximum of two authors per paper is allowed. All co-authors must register separately.
- 7. Submission: Send your papers to sociologydeptseminar2025@gmail.com with the subject line: "Research Paper Submission [Author's Name]".
- 8. Review Process: All submissions will undergo a peer-review process.
- 9. Publication: ICSSR aims to publish a multi-volume collection of selected research papers
